**CICA Board of Directors Meeting – Minutes**  
**ANNUAL MEETING**  
**August 28, 2005**

The meeting began at 2:00 p.m. at the pavilion.

**BOARD OF DIRECTORS PRESENT:**

**Committee Members and Guests Present:** There were approximately 125 Chesapeake Isle residents in attendance. Deputy Zack from the Sheriff's Department was in attendance as a guest speaker.

**Ballots:** Les Fritz handed out ballots for CICA Budget, Annual Maintenance Budget as well as voting ballots for the Board of Director's nominees.

**President's Report:** This past year as President of your Association has been a busy and fulfilling year. Thanks to all the Board and committee members as well as a large army of dedicated workers for making it a great year.

We had a very successful Spring Dinner and 4<sup>th</sup> of July celebration along with other great social events during the year. The board instituted a survey of our aging storm drainage system. To date we have replaced two drainage pipes and know there will be more to address in the future. We are continuing to work on the beach and harbor areas as well as the roads as needed.

Of all the issues tackled by the Board, the struggle with the mandatory maintenance seemed to command a large part of our attention. This culminated on July 28, 2005 when Judge Jackson ruled that all owners in Chesapeake Isle must pay their share of the maintenance and improvement costs for their community.

We will now have two sets of books to account for income and expenses. There will be one for the Community and one for the Association which will create an interesting year for our Treasurer. At the present time the Association is paying community expenses since the community Maintenance Fees will not start coming in until early in 2006.

Revised By-laws will be sent to all association members soon and will reflect the changes necessary to comply with Maryland law and Judge Jackson's ruling.

With this hurdle behind us, we should try to remember that we are all neighbors and need to put our combined efforts towards the good of our community.

Thanks to Jay Gilfillin, Ken Knapp and Mike Szep for all their work on the Board. Their terms are over as of today with both Mike and Ken finishing up six straight years. While they will no longer be on the Board, they can rest assured that they will be called upon to use their talents for the Community's good.

Once again, I would like to sincerely thank all the Board members, especially Brian Clare, Vice President, Sonny Hayes, Treasurer, Janet McKenna, Secretary and all the committee members and that army of hard working neighbors for making my job a much easier one and the community a great place to live.

A special thanks to my wife Karen for all her work and understanding this past year.

### **TREASURER'S REPORT:**

Two budgets will be presented today for votes. One is for the CICA Annual Budget the other is the Maintenance Budget for the Community itself.

There has been a change since the initial report went out. Wages are down due to a mild winter. Currently, there are only two salaried individuals--this is for snow plowing and grass cutting.

We are over budget with the secretarial and legal expenses. Secretarial is over budget due to the large amount of mailings and copying needed for the information to be circulated regarding the court action and other updates throughout the year. The court action also determined our legal budget. And, I believe we will see an additional \$3,500 in legal fees prior to year-end.

Other expenses for the past year are our social events, the 4<sup>th</sup> of July celebration, Halloween, Christmas and the annual dinner are a few. Some of these are misleading though. The 4<sup>th</sup> of July celebration when netted out actually is an income producer for the Association. These figures can be seen on the handout that was circulated. Page four shows a pie chart depicting the different budget areas for the Association.

Our beach area is another area where we had some expenses this year. We replaced the rafts in the beach area as well as added stones to the jetties. We have a backboard for the basket ball court to be put up and are looking to replace some of the worn out playground equipment. The shuffle board was repainted and general maintenance to the area gave us an additional expense to the budget. A lot of the work was done by volunteers who kept the cost down, but there was still some cost associated with these projects.

There was concern raised that a reserve would be needed in case there was an unaccounted expense. The Board approved a maintenance reserve, earmarked especially for just that, unforeseen maintenance expenditure.

Additionally, we replaced some for the drainage pipes in the community and are looking at the rest of the drainage system community wide. Caldwell was regraded to take some of the runoff that was draining into people's yards and redirected to the ditches.

Last year the actual motion was made for the above budget and I am asking for this to be passed. Upon a motion made, duly seconded the CICA budget was approved. The CICA Annual Budget was passed unanimously.

The other budget to be voted on is the General Maintenance Budget (“GMB”). Everyone owning a lot in Chesapeake Isle is entitled to vote. The GMB is calculated on a breakout between Community and CICA income. Each year we looked at the previous year’s ratio for the budget preparation for the upcoming year. This year we used May 2004 through April 2005. The percentage calculated was 56.2% for the GMB expense and 43.8% for CICA expense. Income was factored into the equation which was split with the percentage for each as well. Secretarial expense was not pro rated due to the mailings going out to all the community and not just CICA members. Insurance was also an expense as a whole. (A suggestion from the group came that the insurance amount should be raised. This will be looked into and reported on when our insurance broker is able give us this additional information.) The tractor was pro rated as well as income from the harbor and dock maintenance. The beach improvements are an estimate from the Beach Chairman on what was expended. Roads are a common expense. The only other difference is for Town Watch. With some of the break-in activity there was \$1,500 earmarked to use for outside enforcement to come in and patrol the area if needed.

Since this is the first year at doing the budget this way we are all playing it by ear. If at the end of the year there seems to be some area that needs to be looked at again, we will do so, but based on the figures from the prior year timeframe this seems to be an equitable way to figure the upcoming budget.

A motion was made to accept the General Maintenance Budget.

At this time 3:20 P.M. a ten minute recess was called so the ballots could be collected. The meeting was reconvened at 3:30 P.M. The ballots were tallied and the General Maintenance Budget was passed with 71 approving and 10 against the General Maintenance Budget was passed as presented.

**Guest Speaker**

At this time our guest speaker, Deputy Zack, was introduced. Deputy Zack addressed the community present about the rash of home burglaries and stated that most were summer homes. He indicated that the people responsible were known to the law enforcement and

currently this situation is being monitored. Deputy Zack spoke about what to do if your home was broken into and how to keep it safe. He did explain that calling the 911 number allowed the Sheriff's to monitor these calls. These calls go through the State Police, but the Sheriff's office does listen to them over their system. (He indicated that unfortunately the State Police do not have the means to listen to the radio calls to the Sheriff's office though.) Deputy Zack did say that the closest law enforcement official will be the one responding. He noted that the current system is being revamped and is slated to coincide with the opening of the new barracks on Route 40. Deputy Zack told the community that we are within our rights to have a video tape surveillance to monitor our properties.

**Board Nominees and Election:**

The nominees for the open Board positions are: Mike Burrough, Bill Dryden, Bill Osborne, Ray Perry, Bill Tucker and Art Wood. Each gave a brief biography and stated their personal reasons why they accepted the nomination. At 3:55 P.M. voting for the nominees took place. The new Board members are: Mike Burroughs, Bill Dryden, Bill Tucker and Art Wood.

Thank you to all who accepted the nominations and welcome to the new Board members.

**COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

**Architectural Review:** Mimi Szep was appointed to replace Barry Miller a chairperson of the committee. Committee members were Sue Seeley, Gail Berkheiser, Tom Beaman, Jerry Bruckner, Gordon and Jorja Osborne. The chairperson reported to Ken Knapp the CICA Board member.

Six new houses and six additions to homes were approved. Two sheds and one deck were approved.

The committee had several meetings to discuss revising and updating the Architectural Review Charter. It was unanimously recommended that Chesapeake Isle adopt the county regulation of a 35ft. height restriction for houses. It was also recommended that the charter specifically state that doublewide trailer homes be prohibited in Chesapeake

Isle. The committee also discussed increasing the square footage requirements of new homes and it was felt that since the character of the neighborhood has changed to a predominately year-round community that the old regulations of 1200 sq. ft. living space were inadequate. The new requirements discussed would address heated living space exclusive of any porches or garages. All changes and revisions were submitted to the CICA Board of Directors for approval. Approval is pending.

There are presently 332 lots in Chesapeake Isle (exclusive of Mason Lane) with approximately 40-42 remaining buildable lots. There are presently 261 homes in the community.

**Beach:** Thanks to all beach committee members who work to keep the beach clean and safe for all Chesapeake Isle residents and guests. A great turnout on cleanup day got us off to a smooth start; I am looking forward to another great turnout for our fall cleanup on October 15<sup>th</sup>. We have had a quiet season with lots of use.

Many beach tasks cannot be performed without the assistance of the maintenance committee, so thanks to John Bates and all the other committee members. Thanks to Eddie Earle, who was able to straighten and weld the augers which hold the floats in place.

A major project accomplished this year was construction of two new swim platforms. New ones were needed as one float floated away at the end of last season and was never recovered; the other float had simply worn out and was no longer considered safe.

Tasks completed by the Beach Committee and/or Maintenance Committee this year include:

- Weekly beach cleanup and maintenance (thanks to Fred Berkeihiser, Jim Abel & Ward Keever)
- Spray for termites at pavilion
- Repair piping at pavilion
- Install beach floats
- Replacing life rings & scary eyes
- Repair pipes in pavilion sink
- Install new circuit breaker for A/C

- Install new shelving in pavilion kitchen

We have had a problem involving vandalism at the beach. All the life rings & scary eyes, as well as many of the beach toys were melted in a bonfire and needed to be replaced.

Also, though not necessarily vandalism, people will often throw beer bottles in the fire expecting that they will melt. They often do not melt and then broken glass remains in the fire ring, creating an unsightly mess and safety hazard. Please dispose of bottles and all trash in containers or take it with you; and extinguish all fires before leaving the beach area.

- We have approximately 100 moorings in the Harbor this year. Again thanks to everyone who help accomplish this. It is hard work and we need all the help we can get.
- Joe Turner let a great crew to repair the old pier after storm damage last year. Thanks to you all.
- Sal Tulumello has graciously made us three new benches for the old and new piers. We've installed eyes, which seem to be working to keep the gulls at bay on the old pier.



- After storms or heavy winds it is a good idea to check your mooring lines as we have had instances of the lines twisting, wrapping and choking down.
- The mooring puller has seen better days and we will need to address either doing major repairs or replacing it completely in the near future.

A work crew has been established and meets every Thursday morning from 9 A.M. to 10 A.M. to clean up and do repairs around the Harbor area. We need volunteers to help here, too, if you happen to have some spare time on Thursday mornings.

Again, I appreciate all the fine people who have volunteered their time to help me with this job as I cannot do it alone. **Membership:** As of the date of this Annual Meeting, we have had 247 paid member families for 2005. Although this figure is still 23 families short of our final 2004 total, a substantial amount of the 2004 memberships and maintenance payments were actually received considerably after the 2004 Annual Meeting.

For purposes of voting at the annual meeting, there are presently 243 eligible voting families still owning property in the Isle today and 47 property owners who still remain unpaid. 85% Paid 16% Un-Paid.
