
A Message from the President



Property Lines: Where are they?

If you're curious about what your property line and boundary looks like, Cecil County GIS mapping may have what you're looking for, through the website https://cecilmaps.org/

You are able to view your boundary line, community land, and your neighbors. You can also have an overlay of the most recent or historical satellite photos. While this should never replace an official survey, having a general idea of where property lines are in the absence of property markers is a good home ownership practice.



The State of Maryland also has a <u>short video</u> about how to mark your property and highly recommends getting a professional survey.

Bay-Friendly Practices

Doogie do!

Why should I care, what does it matter anyway?

I should start with explaining that years ago we lived without understanding or care about consequence of our actions in our environment. The blend of science and environment in the 1970's led to rethinking the sustainability of our resources and our precious Chesapeake Bay. I remember as a child on the Bay how clear the water was, how plentiful the catch of crabs and fish were, and look where we are today. The EPA under the Obama administration put the Bay on a diet- to reduce nitrogen, phosphorous and silt by year 2025 by 20%. This diet, like many of our diets, it not going too well. Check out the CBF annual Bay report card on line. The biennial evaluation graded the Bay and its watershed at a D+, unchanged from the 2020 score.

Realizing that the elements entering the Bay are harmful are coming from land, runoff from storm water, drainage, creeks, and streams; programs, organizations, and volunteers sprouted up to help educate and alter the mindset of those living in this vast watershed of 64,000 sq miles to help the future.

What does all of this have to do with DOGGIE DO?

E.coli is normally found in the intestines of humans and animals and is perfectly OK. It is when it escapes into the environment and contaminates water (drinking and swimming) and our food sources that problems arise and health concerns emerge.

Escherichia coli (E. coli) bacteria normally live in the intestines of healthy people and animals. Most types of E. coli are harmless or cause relatively brief diarrhea. But a few strains, such as E. coli O157:H7, can cause severe stomach cramps, bloody diarrhea and vomiting.

Contaminated water

Human and animal stool may pollute ground and surface water, including streams, rivers, lakes and water used to irrigate crops. Although public water systems use chlorine, ultraviolet light or ozone to kill E. coli, some E. coli outbreaks have been linked to contaminated municipal water supplies.

Private water wells are a greater cause for concern because many don't have a way to disinfect water. Rural water supplies are the most likely to be contaminated. Some people also have been infected with E. coli after swimming in pools or lakes contaminated with stool. (https://www.mayoclinic.org/diseases-conditions/e-coli/symptoms-causes/syc-20372058)

Agriculture has been encouraged to change their livestock management by fencing off and not allowing animals access to enter stream and creeks running through their farm, naturally there is "too much poo" on a farm to bag and pick up, but keeping it out of the water sources that ultimately drain into the Bay is very important. Unfortunately, the State of Pennsylvania is a large contributor to the harmful ingredients entering our Bay. Hopefully, in the future some advancements can be made to lessen their impact.

Pet Waste

Many substances deposited on land end up in our streams, creeks, and Chesapeake Bay. These include:

Pesticides Household Chemicals Fertilizers Oils and Antifreeze Pet Waste

Pet waste carrying disease causing organisms can make our water unsafe to drink or swim. When pet waste is not disposed of properly it can cause health problems for children playing outside, gardeners and can pollute the nearest waterway. The CC Health Department monitors water in several of our rivers and sometimes closes beaches due to health hazards. Some of the other bacteria carried by dogs and cats are Campylobacteriosis, Salmonellosis, Toxocariasis, and Toxoplamsmosis, which is really dangerous to pregnant women.

The nearest waterway in the Isle is just at the end of most streets. Just think if 100 dogs live in the isle and their waste is not picked up and disposed of properly; in 3 days there would be enough E.coli in the stormwater run-off to tag the swimming area a health hazard. (Ricciuti, 2003)

Next time you out for a walk in the Isle think about the pile of poo along the lawns and roadside. If you are a dog owner- pick it up. The little bags attach to your leash, and it is not so bad to bag it and dispose of at home. If you are not a dog owner think about what journey that pile makes down the street to the waterway and what bacteria is being carried into the Bay.

I hope this helps make sense out of a common-sense rule, which helps our community be better stewards for the health of the Bay and for our inhabitants.

Our annual Sock Burning ritual was held on Sunday, March 24. The weather was ideal and roughly two dozen Chesapeake Isle residents gathered at the beach where fire keeper, Tom Grieco, had prepared the requisite fire. Select sailors offered this "Ode to Sock Burning" before the incineration began.

Chesapeake Isle folks have a rather odd tradition When the sun swings to its equinoxical position, We build a little fire east of the docks, We doff our shoes and burn our winter socks.

Yes, we burn our socks at the Equinox; You might think that's peculiar, but we think it's not, See, they're the same socks we put on last fall, And we never took 'em off to wash 'em, not at all...

So we burn our socks at the equinox In a little ol' fire burning nice and hot. Some think incineration is the only solution, 'Cause washin' 'em contributes to Chesapeake's pollution.

Through the spring and the summer and into the fall, We go around not wearin' any socks at all, Just stinky bare feet stuck in old deck shoes, Whether out on the water or sippin' a brew.

So if you sail into our harbor on the 24th of March, And you smell a smell like Limburger sautéed with laundry starch, You'll know you're downwind of the Cl docks, Where we're burning our socks at the equinox.

Two rocks were defaced with graffiti near the launch for small sailboats at the harbor. The graffiti markings were not recognizable symbols or images (one pink and one purple). Clearing Lots of Trees



All property owners should familiarize themselves with the rules of clearing trees and vegetation on their lots in Chesapeake Isle. Cecil County demands a permit for tree removal if the property lies within 1000 ft of the Bay. Additionally, the Chesapeake Isle Architectural Review Committee (ARC) has established requirements for new home construction. All ARC information is located in our Welcome Guidebook and the Chesapeake Isle website



Signs Erected on Community Property

It was brought to the Board's attention that someone fabricated a large symbol out of 2x4's and lodged it at the end of the jetty at the beach. On 2/5, Chesapeake Isle volunteers removed it. CICA does not allow items to be arbitrarily built on community property. Such items will be promptly removed.

Dumping Yard Waste on Community Property

Chesapeake Isle History Earliest Residents and Landholders 1717 to 1749

Background

This is part two on the history of ownership of our community. Part one, which can be found in *The Isle News*, Winter 2024, describes the Native Americans who occupied the surrounding area and the land patent granted from Lord Baltimore to Peregrine Browne in 1651. Browne's heirs had possession for a short period but were forced to sell the property because of unpaid debts.

Richard Bennett III "Estate Bargain Hunter"

Richard Bennett III bought the 1000 acre Turkey Point Plantation in 1717 at public auction in Annapolis. This included the slaves, land and livestock for £574.

Beginning about 1700, Bennett collected land and estates with a passion. Between then and his death in 1749, his name appears literally hundreds of times in the land records of Talbot, Queen Annes, Dorchester, Kent, and Cecil Counties. He was named mostly as a buyer or mortgagor and quite often as a "forecloser" on the plantation of a less fortunate neighbor. By his death, he owned 23,000 acres and one of the only colonial merchant fleets.


America's First Multimillionaire

He was Maryland's greatest land baron, its largest ship owner, its most important merchant and financier. He owned more slaves, more cattle, more hogs, more horses, more plantations than any other man. And in an era when tobacco was king, he was by far its biggest grower on the Eastern Shore.

His business empire began with a large inheritances but also through his own initiatives and ambition. Being "well connected" got him the job as rent roll keeper to Lord Baltimore. Bennett had an 8-year contract to collect the rents owed to the proprietor. After paying Baltimore a predetermined sum, Bennett and partner, a fellow Catholic, kept the remainder. Later in the 1730s and 1740s, Lord Baltimore commissioned Bennett again as rent roll keeper.

A Forgotten Man

Richard Bennett III lived in Queen Anne's County, which has completely forgotten about him. In the Eighteenth Century, his name was a household word! Yet, in the State of Maryland there is nothing to recognize his memory. No schools, parks or buildings are dedicated to his name. The only geographical memorial to him is the sign shown here. This spot of land called Bennett's Point is where he lived and died. No known portrait exists, nor letters or diaries telling of his personal affairs.



What do we know about him?

When he died, *The Maryland Gazette* newspaper praised his many charities in a complimentary obituary describing his vast wealth and said that he was "a model of generosity to his slaves, his employees and his debtors". Bennett's lengthy will provided the foundation for some of the great Maryland estates renowned in later years. Even so, the will was the source of one of the most bitter legal battles in provincial history.

"Born With A Silver Spoon In His Mouth"

Richard Bennett III was born September 16,1667. His mother, Henriett,a was well regarded in Maryland society despite the fact that being Catholic was a disadvantage at the time. His father, also named Richard (b.1644, d.1670) had died four months earlier in the Wye River while duck hunting according to tradition. The boy thus inherited his father's estate almost at the moment of his birth. The estate was not extremely large but 8 years later he also inherited his grandfather's estate (Richard Bennett Sr. b.1609, d.1675). Richard Bennett Sr. was at one time governor of Virginia, very wealthy and had strong political ties with the Crown in England.

Mother Remarried Very Well

Young Richard was not fatherless for very long. Within 2 years Henrietta Maria Neale Bennett was married again, this time to Philemon Lloyd of the famous Wye House Lloyds.

As mistress of Wye House, Madam Lloyd (a title of high respect, roughly equivalent to "Lady" in England) became the most glamorous woman of her day. Her beauty and strength of character are legendary. Much is known about her and she was very influential in early Maryland history. Her 12 children from the Bennett and Lloyd families helped spread the power and money around.

Turkey Point Plantation has a new owner

Richard Bennett III died in 1749. He was married to Elizabeth Rousby who was 15 years younger but preceded him in death. He never married again. His will stated that Turkey Point and nearby Palmers Island (today called Watson Island) be given to his 17 year old cousin, Bennett Chew.


