Many people move to Chesapeake Isle to enjoy the community spaces such as our beautiful beach area and the fantastic working harbor. Our Man of the Year, Mike Klinger, works diligently to ensure that the community spaces are functional and safe for all to use. We all benefit from his care and attention.

Mike was raised in central PA; he enjoyed playing sports such as baseball, football, and wrestling. This love of sports is part of his life today as he takes much pleasure in watching his sons play and cheering on his favorite teams: Penn State, the Commanders, and the Phillies. Mike attended the

public schools in the Bellefonte School District where he met his wife, Jess, in a high school chemistry class. Their high school romance proved to stand the test of time and after 9 years of dating, they married on April 7, 2001. Together they have 2 sons: Alex, who is 22 years old and works in Havre de Grace as a boat mechanic, and Aaron who is 17 and can be seen around the neighborhood either in his truck or on his mower. Woman of the Year 2024: Victoria Rodriguez Garvey

Vicky was born in Ponce, Puerto Rico. As a child, she was a competitive swimmer, and in high school, she also played volleyball, which continued into college. Academically, Vicky excelled in school. She left Puerto Rico to attend Cabrini College in the Philadelphia area for undergraduate studies. She then earned her master's degree from Western Maryland College (now called McDaniel University). As a professional educator, Vicky has

been influential in ensuring that public school children have opportunities to meet their potential. She was an English Language and Math teacher for over 35 years in the Red Clay School District in Delaware, serving also as the department chair and Diversity Champion. Currently, Vicky is the Multilingual Community Schools Advisor for Cecil County Public Schools; she supports the learning of hundreds of students acquiring English as their second language and connects families with resources in the Cecil County community.

In 1996, the Vicky moved to Chesapeake Isle with her husband, Barry. Together they raised a daughter, Kyla, and a son, Eric. Kyla attended St. Mary's College of Maryland with a double major in environmental studies and anthropology and is an aspiring teacher getting her master's degree in elementary education. Eric earned an undergraduate degree in civil engineering in the honors program at the University of Maryland and now works as a design engineer for Site Studios, a local engineering company. Being an involved supportive parent is one of the most important roles Vicky cherishes.

Within Chesapeake Isle, Vicky has been a fantastic volunteer; her leadership and guidance over the years is invaluable. 2025 Annual Community Maintenance Fee: \$360/year per lot (mandatory)

All money will be used to maintain and improve community common areas, including the roads, beach and harbor areas, and other community lands.

2025 Annual CICA Voluntary Membership Fee: \$25 per family (optional)

In addition to the mandatory community maintenance fees, please join CICA—membership is only \$25 per year! These funds are used to support the "extras," including mooring services, the pavilion, game equipment at the beach, and community events such as children's parties and holiday festivities. A portion is also used to fund a community AED, which is available to ALL property owners (not just CICA members).

Please note that you must be a CICA member to reserve the pavilion, use fee-based mooring services, store watercraft on the racks at the harbor (for an additional fee), access game closet keys, attend various community events that are paid for using CICA funds, or become a Board member.

Upcoming dates at the Harbor for the Fall 2024

- Friday, October 25, 2024: Deadline to remove boats, kayaks, and dinghies
- Saturday, October 26, 2024: Mooring pull and delivery

The harbor will be closed to all traffic on the morning of 10/26 If you are finished using your mooring for the season, please email to inform the harbormaster.

Reminders: Storage of all watercraft is seasonal.

- No watercraft should remain in the harbor area during the off-season, including dinghy/kayak racks, Sunfish, or Hobie Cat areas.
- We understand that there are some hardcore paddlers and sailors out there who may still want to use their craft beyond October 25. If you intend to USE your craft (not store your craft) beyond October 25, contact Joe.
- If you need assistance in moving your dinghy/kayak/paddleboard/canoe from the harbor back to your house, also contact Joe.

Annual Meeting 2024 August 25, 2024

Ten board members were present on August 25, 2024, at the Pavilion for the Annual Meeting. In addition, approximately 75 community members attended in person. 7 proxy votes were received in sealed envelopes. The proposed FY2025 Budget for Community Maintenance and CICA Voluntary Membership were approved.

Community Maintenance

The CM Budget totals \$235,680 based on the income from:

- Community maintenance fee of \$360/lot paid by lot owners: \$114,480
- Property transfers paid by new owners at settlement: \$1,200
- A reserve transfer: \$120,000

Some of the larger expenses include:

- Shoreline erosion work: \$145,000
- Road repairs and road drainage work: \$36,000
- Hiring a paid bookkeeper: \$6,000
- Reserve savings for pier decking replacement in a few years: \$11,250 (of a total reserve allocation of \$14,380)

CICA Voluntary Membership

The 2025 Budget for CICA Members totals \$19,176 based on the income from memberships and limited activities/events. The membership fee remains \$25 for FY2025.

Dog Etiquette for a Happy Neighborhood

As much as we love our four-legged friends, it's important to ensure that they're not only enjoying themselves but also being good neighbors. Practicing proper dog etiquette helps keep our community safe, clean, and enjoyable for everyone. Here are a few key reminders on responsible dog ownership:

- 1. Always Pick Up After Your Dog We've all experienced the unpleasant surprise of stepping into something left behind by a dog. Picking up after your pet is not just courteous but also essential for health and sanitation. Dog waste contains bacteria and parasites that can contaminate water sources and spread disease. Make it a habit to carry waste bags with you during walks and properly dispose of them at home.
- Leash Aggressive or Unpredictable Dogs Leashing your dog is essential, especially if your pet has a history of being
 aggressive or easily startled. Not all dogs are comfortable around strangers or other dogs, and it's your responsibility to control

<u>Chesapeake Isle History</u> Earliest Residents and Landholders 1801 to 1874

Background

This is part 4 on the history of our community. Parts 1 thru 3 can be found in the previous issues of *The Isle News*. *Part 3 describes the Chew family period. In 1800, Anna Marie Tilghman Chew sold the Turkey Point plantation with slaves to her niece Julianna Paca for \$1.*



Julianna Paca

Julianna C. Tilghman (b.1783-d.1861) was the daughter of Major Richard Tilghman and his wife, Mary Tilghman. She inherited the plantation here and also the now called Garrett Island in the Susquehanna River that is bridged by current day Route 40. She married John Philemon Paca in 1800. Julianna and her husband lived on Wye Island in Queens Anne's County. She

inherited half of the island called Wye Plantation. John inherited Wye Hall from his father who owned the other half of the island. They had seven children. William Bennett was the oldest who later instigated an event, disgracing the family.

<u>John Philemon Paca</u>

John P. Paca (b.1771-d.1840) was the son of William Paca Esq., a signer of the Declaration of Independence and an early Maryland governor. He, however, did not inherit his fathers talents. He was raised as a pampered child on a 2700 acre estate in luxurious surroundings. He was described as a remarkably handsome man, tall and of imposing presence with a courtly manner and



aristocratic air. It is said that he was very exclusive of his associations, very frugal with money except for the purpose of display or show. He was fond of having distinguished people at his home and entertained in magnificent style. He was known to be arrogant and not well informed. At some point he inherited his father's library and attempted self improvement by reading. His associates claimed that this did not help him much though. He remained narrow minded until his death.

The Marriage of Julianna and John P. Paca

John P. Paca's marriage to Julianna was a shock to the friends of the latter, although the Tilghman's and Paca's families were equally rich and influential. John's weakness and vanity were so conspicuous that it was a surprise that he should find favor in the eyes of such a sophisticated woman. Julianna was the adopted daughter of her aunt, Mrs. Chew from whom she received a magnificent property on Wye Island along with Turkey Point plantation. Their marriage resulted in the consolidation of two adjacent, fabulous estates in Queen Anne's County.

Events at the Turkey Point Plantation in the 1800's

In 1832 John and Julianna sold four acres of land to the US government in the amount of \$564 for the construction of the Turkey Point Lighthouse. It's not clear exactly how many slaves worked on the Turkey Point Estates plantation here. It's likely that the number varied over the years. We do know that the 1840 slave census listed the Paca's owning 147 slaves. There were at least 11 slaves stationed here in 1861 but they

Runaways.-Eleven negroes, the property of the late Mrs. Julianna Paca, of Queen Anne's county, Md. absconded from the Turkey Point farm, in this county, on Saturday night last. There were three men, three women, and five children. It is supposed they took a boat and proceeded to the Susquehanna, and thence up the Canal to Pennsylva-

escaped and a reward was offered for their capture according to the June,15th 1861 *Cecil Democrat* newspaper. The Paca's leased out 5 fisheries here along the shores of Turkey Point on both the Elk and North East Rivers. In the 1800s this area had an unbelievable abundance of fish. In

1842 Cecil County had no less than 50 fisheries that employed 900 men. The catches were so large that they often had to lower the net to let many escape because it was too heavy to pull in. John P. Paca died in 1841 and shortly after his death, Julianna moved to Turkey Point to live here which she described as her "home estate" when she wrote her will in 1842. She lived here for about 6 years then returned to Wye Island where she died in 1861. On April 25th 1874, The Cecil Whig advertised an auction of the Turkey Point Plantation.

The Tragedy of the Paca Family



The founder of the family fortune was William Paca Esq. (b.1740-d.1799). He was a lawyer, politician, 3rd Governor of MD and a signer of the American Declaration of Independence. The fortunes of the Paca's prospered until the beginning of the Civil War. From that period they began to decline surprisingly rapidly. In her will Julianna split the Wye Plantation between her sons William Bennett and Edward T., a decision that later led to bloodshed within the family. Edward T. received most of the property at Turkey Point but he later died and the will was again revised to include his children. In 1865, The Baltimore Sun reported that William Bennett Paca, along with 3 of his sons were indicted for murder for shooting his nephew and an uncle at Wye Island. The article described two of William Bennett Paca's sons as "not of sound mind". The double murder resulted from a dispute over the late Edward T.s portion of his inheritance of a portion of Wye Island that was bequeathed from his mother. The nephew and uncle were shot by William Bennett and one of his "idiot" sons while digging post holes. Previously, all the male slaves had run away to join the Union Army so they had to do this manual labor themselves. William Bennett and sons claimed self defense. William Bennett and three of his sons were acquitted, (including two who were mentally ill). The not guilty verdict enraged the community. Public opinion was that they got away with murder. There was talk of lynching them, anyhow! After that the world turned their back on the William Bennett Paca family. Shortly after William died. Two of his sons committed suicide, a daughter died of accidental poisoning; and his wife and the rest of their children were confined to mental institutions.
